## Risk Management Reforms

Over the past few years, the fraternity system has been in the spotlight nationally and across campus communities due to unfortunate incidents at chapter facilities involving chapter members. The UCLA Interfraternity Council (IFC) Executive Board, in accord with campus administration, UCPD, other campus colleagues, and the IFC Presidents'

Council, decided it was necessary to revise and revamp our outdated Risk Management Policy to proactively foster a safer environment for men in the fraternities and their guests.

It became my responsibility, as the IFC Vice President of Risk Management, to take the initiative in drafting and ultimately completing this policy for the UCLA fraternity system. In order to create ample time for these policies to be reassessed and revamped, it was necessary to put an indefinite hold on in-house events with alcohol.

Over a period of two months, the IFC Executive Board and the IFC Presidents' Council worked to come up with new ideas and procedures to reduce risk at chapter facilities and events. Some of these new practices mandated security guards and third-party bartenders for all in-house events with alcohol, as well as defined event areas in each chapter facility to ensure that all members and guests stay in a single area.

At the end of this period, a meeting was held on February 23 to vote these new policies into the bylaws for the entire fraternity community. While the new practices are a needed upgrade over the past bylaws, the IFC Executive Board is aware that the policy can be adjusted and reassessed as needed.

The IFC Executive Board and IFC Presidents' Council are confident that these new practices are a step in the right direction, as they have immediately helped to mitigate risk, and will allow our community to continue to teach men to be leaders and positive contributors to the campus community and society.

## New Faculty Advisor

Professor Tim Fisher, the new Mechanical and Aerospace Engineering department chair, recently joined the UCLA community. A Phi Psi from Cornell University, he was quick to get involved with the chapter this past quarter, agreeing to serve as our first faculty advisor. He plans to work with the scholarship committee to strengthen academics within the house through professional development/ research opportunity workshops, and to instill a more intellectually focused culture. We hope to see the opportunities for growth that he has presented come to fruition in the 2018-19 academic year.



Upon his return from the war, he played one final season for the UCLA baseball team in 1946. He turned down an offer to play minor league baseball to concentrate on a career in law, and he worked his way up the ladder from policeman, to detective, to the chief deputy district attorney for the city of Los Angeles. In 1969, he was the lead prosecutor in the trial of Sirhan Sirhan for the assassination of Senator Robert Kennedy. In 1970, he was appointed to the California Courts of Appeal, where he served as a judge for 20 years.

Buck passed away in Burlington, Washington, in 2012. He is survived by two daughters and four grandchildren.

## A letter to CA Epsilon Chapter of Phi Kappa Psi

From Eloise Fiske, wife of J. Peter Fiske, Jr., '63-668

*Editorial Note: John Peter Fiske, Jr., passed away in November 2013, during a time when The Bruin Phi Psi was not being published. (See notice of his passing, along with many other Phi Psi brothers whose deaths were never reported, on page 6.) Eloise Fiske received the California Epsilon House Corporation's letter of April 2018, which detailed policies of Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity regarding hazing. In the following excerpt from her letter, Mrs. Fiske shares her own feelings and concerns for the Fraternity.*

Dear Phi Kappa Psi Fraternity,

Even though my husband's passing was nearly five years ago, I still have trouble responding to or receiving mail addressed to him. We were married for 44 years.

I read your letter to your brothers. I have never agreed with hazing, especially with liquor. I am glad to see the changes you are making. I could never understand using liquor, beer, or wine in the fraternity when pledges and members are under 21. Some of the pledges had never had a drink before, and maybe did not care to drink. Of course, if this was the case, maybe a pledge was not acceptable in the fraternity. Some can "hold it"; others can't. How many did it just for the need to belong and be accepted?

As for sexual abuse: there should be zero tolerance on both the male and female alike. Too much drinking is most often the cause. You should have non-drinking members who watch out for the "drunk" — both male and female. Respect for each other is key. From the time we met in college to the day my husband died, we had a designated-driver policy. One of us did not drink when going out to parties, etc. That held true for 48 years.

Good luck on making your changes. Being young is not easy. It is the time of decision-making both in career and personal life. You're pushed into relying on yourself. What every parent fears is whether their sons and daughters have all the confidence they need to be who they are. Parents must let go — I had to do it three times.

## UCLA Athletic Hall of Fame



This year, eight amazing Bruins were elected to the UCLA Athletic Hall of Fame Class of 2018. Among the inductees was a very special Phi Psi alum, **Lynn "Buck" Compton, '40-176**. Buck was a star in both baseball and football in the 1940s. Even

more importantly, he was a WWII hero, a distinguished jurist, and an example to his fellow brothers of Phi Kappa Psi.

Buck earned all-conference honors as a catcher on the baseball team, and as a two-way guard playing both offense and defense for the football team. His career batting average at UCLA was around .340, and he was named a charter member of the UCLA Baseball Hall of Fame in 1988. In 1942, he led the UCLA football team to its first-ever win over USC and its first-ever conference championship. The 1942 Bruins were also the first UCLA team ever to go to the Rose Bowl.

Compton joined the Army in 1942 during World War II, serving with Easy Company of the 101st Airborne. He parachuted behind enemy lines at Normandy during the D-Day invasion, and fought at the Battle of the Bulge, for which he earned several military distinctions, including a Silver Star, Bronze Star, and a Purple Heart.

## Recruitment and Membership

Over the past few years, we have seen our chapter grow immensely. After initiating our fall and winter classes, California Epsilon has become a major player on Fraternity Row.

After recruiting the third largest pledge class out of all 22 Interfraternity Council Chapters, we were determined not to slow down as we went into winter quarter. Using remote video training sessions to get our newly initiated brothers up to speed, we were more than ready for Winter Recruitment. Our preparation produced results unmatched by any other chapter at UCLA. At 17 pledges, our pledge class was the single largest on the row, and we were one of only two chapters to crack the double digits.

The preparations for fall 2018 recruitment are already well underway. The Recruitment Committee is working on the necessary logistics and prepping for the new Panhellenic-Style Recruitment that will be implemented this next session. We already have 15 potential new members who have expressed significant interest in our chapter after meeting brothers at outreach events this spring.

The Recruitment Team will continue working to bring in the best pledge class in our history. However, proposed new National regulations regarding the duration of pledgship could affect not only how new member education is carried out, but also the chapter's general emphasis of brotherhood. We seek to ensure that the new members exemplify values and motives consistent with those of our brotherhood, and that the pledgship process gives us time to really get to know them.

Our aim is to pair current brothers with new members individually. This way, they can spend quality time together and get to know one another — whether by studying on campus, spending time at the house, sharing a meal, or participating in campus activities — and the new members can come to know our fraternity on a personal and meaningful level, in a way which demonstrates that we are about much more than just social events. We aim to keep up this process of familiarization throughout the pledgship period, so we can better understand which new members share our fraternity's values and have its best interests in mind. Hence the importance of maintaining membership review for those newly initiated. We believe that this emphasis on familiarization will allow us to adapt to all National regulations while maintaining our high standard of membership. Together, with a successful rush, we believe we can sustain the quality of brotherhood that makes Phi Psi the premier fraternity at UCLA.

*We continue to update our chapter membership list, and have learned of the passing of many Cal Ep brothers since the previous issue of this newsletter was published. They are listed below by decade.*

### CAL EP FOUNDING BROTHERS — 1931

**Bayley E. Kohlmeier, '31-10**, died August 27, 1998, at age 93. He had lived in Davis, California.

**Robert J. Blake, '31-17**, of Cupertino, California, died December 1, 2000. He had worked as a geologist for Shell Oil in Long Beach.

**Mortford L. Riddick, '31-21**, of Irvine, California, died June 29, 1995, at age 87.

**W. Glenn Cunningham, '31-26**, of Glendale, California, passed away on December 25, 2002.

**Bernard C. Miller, '31-59**, died July 19, 2002, at age 92. He had resided in Vancouver, Washington.

**Samuel N. Gates, '31-70**, of Newport Beach, California, died April 26, 2003, at age 91.

**Jack S. Morrison, '31-71**, former UCLA associate professor of Theatre Arts, died February 15, 1997, at age 84. He received the University's Alumni Achievement Award in 1979, and served as executive director of the American Theatre Association in Washington, DC, 1976-1982.

### 1930s
